Course Overview:

<p>Counseling Psyc is an experiential special topics course that will provide a beginning survey or overview of a variety of counseling theories. Together we will explore the basic concepts and techniques associated with each theory presented. Students will be expected to engage in experiential activities that will help to clarify the major concepts discussed. To fully realize this goal, it is important that we create an environment that is respectful, honest, and tolerant.</p>
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Course Objectives:

<p>*Knowledge Development: To acquire a working knowledge regarding the basic concepts found in a variety of major counseling theories.</p>

<p>*Personal Development: To identify, discuss, and further develop personal understanding of constructs discussed as applied to individual situations.</p>

<p><i>Please note, the Classroom is not a therapeutic setting, and although confidentiality between students is desirable it cannot be guaranteed. Each student is requested not to reveal any information that the student considers to be harmful if publicly revealed.</i></p>

Class Requirements:

Attendance- Students are expected to attend all regularly scheduled class meetings. Unless prior arrangements have been made, missing more than two classes will result in the loss of potential points from your participation grade.

Participation- Please be sure to have read your assignments prior to coming to class. Participating in the class provides you with an opportunity to gain points towards your final grade. Lack of participation may be a deciding factor in the case of borderline grades.

Journal- Students are required to complete a journal that demonstrates understanding and personal application of each counseling theory studies. Refer to handout for grading guidelines. They will be collected prior to mid-terms and finals and will be reflected in both grades. **Journals are separate from class notes and must be constructed in a way as to:**

- *Make a judgment as to the effectiveness of each theory as a medium for understanding development as applied to the personal developmental experience.
- *Make a judgment as to the effectiveness of each theory as a medium for understanding the personal development of at least one person of another gender or cultural population.
- *Include and identify major concepts of each theory as applied.

Lifestyle Analysis- Written assignment, guidelines will be provided in class.

Written Exams 1, 2, 3, and 4- These examinations will consider the knowledge and skills covered in class sessions and related readings up to time of testing. The exams are NOT cumulative.
