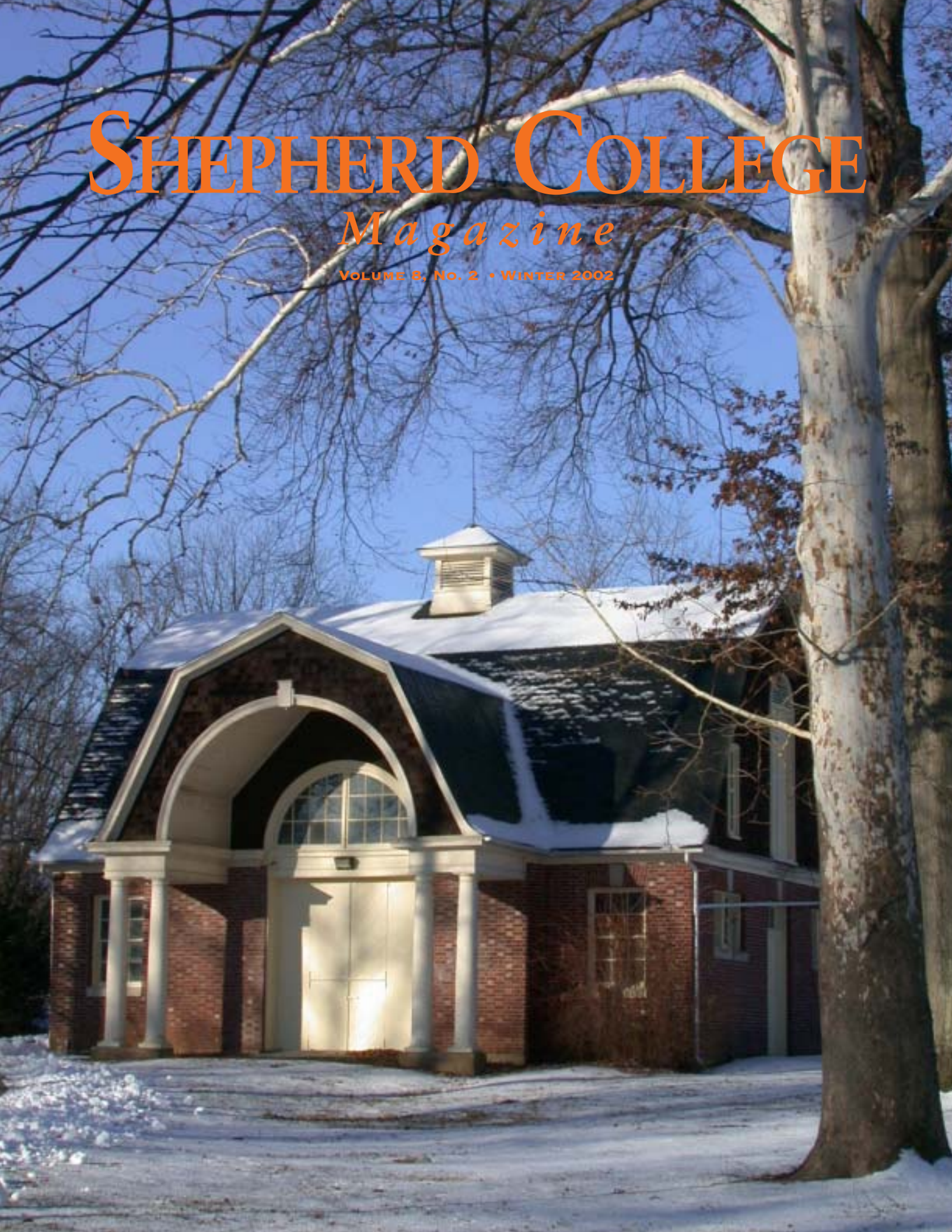

From the President

Fund raising at Shepherd

Like many states, West Virginia's legislature is reducing budget allocations to higher education. The importance of private philanthropic giving to higher education thus is becoming more important. At Shepherd College, we are fortunate to have this support established and flourishing.

Funds given by alumni, friends, corporations and foundations, and government grants increasingly enable Shepherd to enhance its academic services. The investments made by these donors will

continue to be an increasingly greater part of the College's future budget planning.

The Office of College Advancement coordinates private fund raising at Shepherd with the Shepherd College Foundation and the Shepherd College Alumni Association. This partnership identifies potential donors to College programs and encourages private support through the annual fund, major gifts, planned gifts, grants and contracts, investment income, and alumni membership dues.

The Shepherd College Foundation plays an increasingly important role in the economic well-being of the College. The Foundation's board of directors, led by President Jim Davis and Executive Vice President Monica Lingenfelter, provides outstanding professional management for endowed funds given to the Foundation by alumni and friends who support Shepherd's long-term financial health. During the 2002 academic year, the Foundation's endowment is providing over \$800,000 in scholarships and program support.

The Foundation is assisting the College with special capital projects, such as the Ram Stadium and Scarborough Library expansions. It also has established the Scarborough Society to provide annual support for library programs and acquisitions. The Foundation's willingness to meet the College's long-term financial needs is a major reason we are able to expand our programs.

The Joseph McMurrin Society is a major source of pride to Shepherd. The Society recognizes alumni and friends who include Shepherd in their estate plans. It currently has 60 members and is growing. Examples of McMurrin Society members' gifts include a major estate gift to the Scarborough Library by Dr. Sara Knutti (daughter-in-law of the College's seventh president, John Knutti) and the charitable trust gift to the sciences from the estate of John Conard, a 1939 alumnus.

Shepherd also is seeking and obtaining grants from foundations, corporations, and government agencies to purchase equipment, develop innovative teaching programs, and to provide support for faculty research. During the past year, Shepherd received \$1 million from such grants. Some of these grants require local contributions, and we are fortunate that the Shepherd College Foundation provides matching funds for this purpose.

Shepherd's Alumni Association, led by President Don Jones and Alumni Affairs Director Melissa Allen, serves over 17,000 living alumni. The board of directors sets the Association's annual budget which is funded by dues and income generated from investments. Its budget includes line items for scholarships, partial funding of the *College Magazine*, faculty development, and special requests by the College for academic program support.

Sen. Byrd on hand to dedicate new library, legislative studies center

Senator Robert C. Byrd delivered the keynote address at the dedication of the Robert C. Byrd Center for Legislative Studies and Scarborough Library Addition on August 22.

Senator Byrd obtained \$13.22 million in federal funding for the Scarborough Library addition. A great supporter of Shepherd College, Senator Byrd also obtained \$9 million for the Robert C. Byrd Science and Technology Center which was dedicated in 1997.

The new library addition adds 46,000 square feet to the 35-year-old Scarborough Li-

brary. Renovations to the old section of the library are scheduled to be completed by August 2003, at which time the library will move back into that space also and become fully-operational.

The Robert C. Byrd Center for Legislative Studies is housed in the new library addition and is operated by the Congressional Education Foundation, a private, nonpartisan, and nonprofit educational organization. The Center will focus on scholarly research and public programs designed to promote better understanding of the U.S. Congress. The Center will conduct seminars, workshops, teacher institutes, and public lectures and conferences. ❖

Shepherd passes North Central Association reaccreditation

President David L. Dunlop is pleased to report that the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools has informed the College that it has successfully passed the accreditation review which was conducted February 25-27.

Shepherd's next comprehensive evaluation is scheduled for 2011-2012 with no progress reports, no monitoring reports, no contingency reports, and no other visits required during the next 10 years.

"This is the best accreditation report that I have ever seen," said President Dunlop. "The Shepherd College Board of Governors and I are extremely proud of the accomplishments of this College and its faculty, staff, and students."

Institutional accreditation evaluates an entire institution and accredits it as a whole. In addition to evaluating a college's educational activities, an evaluation team from the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools assessed such characteristics as governance and administration, financial stability, admissions and student personnel services, institutional resources, student academic achievement, institutional effectiveness, and relationships with constituencies outside the institution.

Shepherd College has been accredited by the North Central Association since 1950. ♣

During the 2000-2001 academic year, the Association established its first-ever endowment gift to the College in its history. The \$50,000 Alumni Association Endowed Library Fund is funded by income from the Association's affinity credit card that reflects alumni devotion to their alma mater.

The Alumni Association's annual fund campaign provides additional funding for academic and athletic scholarships and academic programs as designated by donors. The Association also has established a fund through its annual golf tournament for nonrevenue generating sports programs for discretionary use as determined by the athletic director.

Shepherd parents also are involved in their students' lives by participating in the newly established Parents Club managed by the Alumni Association. The Parents Club purchased a 65-inch TV for the College Center that was dedicated during Family Weekend. Future projects will provide opportunities for parents to enjoy an active role in the College's growth.

As we continue to evolve, Shepherd will explore private philanthropy as an increasingly important component of its budget planning. This avenue of support will help to meet the needs of our future alumni and enhance the value of a Shepherd education. ♣ *David L. Dunlop*

Naylor appointed to College's governing board by Gov. Wise

Shepherdstown resident Sarah Payne Naylor has been appointed to the Shepherd College Board of Governors by Governor Bob Wise. She will serve a four-year term on the 12-member governing board.

Naylor is a partner in The Naylor Group, a consulting practice that deals with workplace diversity training and public policy advocacy training and planning for nonprofit organizations. She has served as the assistant director of the Lutheran Office for Governmental Affairs in Washington, D.C., from 1988 to 1994 and as the director of the Lutheran Arizona Office for Governmental Ministry from 1985 to 1988. Naylor was also the director of Job Mart, an employment counseling program of the Lutheran Social Ministry of Arizona from 1982 to 1985 and the job developer for the Arizona Department of Economic Security and the United States Catholic Conference from 1978 to 1982.

Naylor attended California State University in Sacramento and holds certification from the Institute for Educational Leadership, the Institute for Cultural Awareness, and the Institute for Socioanalysis. She has been a member of the board of directors of the Lutheran General Health Systems in Chicago and of the Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service and has served on the National Executive Council of the Lutheran Church in America.

Dean Patricia Dwyer: Diplomat for student learning

Dr. Patricia Dwyer has built a reputation on campus among faculty, staff, and students alike for her open, warm, and perceptive personality and her tireless advocacy for student learning. She is known as an effective consensus builder who gets things done. She has just been named dean for teaching, learning, and instructional resources, and she's up to the test.

Dwyer is fresh from the challenge of establishing a campus-wide assessment program for academic departments and student support offices. This was an important part of what the North Central reaccreditation team was looking for during its decennial visit this past spring. Because of her ability to facilitate consensus, Dwyer was tapped in 1998 by Dr. Mark Stern, vice president of academic affairs, to lead the new assessment initiative on campus.

"Before Patricia came on board, assessment was going nowhere," said Stern. "Then she changed the emphasis from 'assessment' to 'assessment of student learning' and everyone could see why we needed to work on this." The College's assessment efforts earned a special commendation by the reaccreditation team.

Assessment committee member Rhonda Smith, professor of art, echoed Stern's enthusiasm for Dwyer's leadership skills. "I am always impressed with her ability to diffuse situations and to make everyone feel at ease. She inspires trust. She has this calm demeanor and pleasant smile

and never seems to get upset or angry."

In her new role as dean, Dwyer will continue her responsibility for assessment of student learning, and she'll pick up supervisory responsibility for the writing center and the honors program. She'll continue to make headway on the establishment of a center for teaching and learning, and she'll continue, as associate professor of English, to teach two classes each semester.

Dwyer finds administration fulfilling, but she would never want to leave the classroom behind. She enjoys learning from the students and the energy she derives from her interactions with them. She thinks it's important for administrators to teach because it keeps them in touch with the pressures and joys of the classroom. "Teaching gives administrators a sense of credibility with the faculty," she said. She has recently taught American and world literature, composition, American ethnic literature, contemporary poetry, and American transcendentalism.

Students rave about Dwyer. Jamie Piasecky, an honors biology student who works for Dwyer, says, "She's very enthusiastic about the material. A lot of other professors—you have to get up to

their level. But she makes you feel like an equal, like you're learning with her rather than from her."

Dwyer developed her love for literature as a child. Her parents limited television, so she relished frequent trips to

the library and getting lost in books. She remembers the first time, during her junior year of high school, that she heard the explication of a poem. "I was mesmerized by the poet's ability to capture such poignant feeling in so few words," she said, "and by our teacher's insight and ability to communicate that to us." That experience solidified her desire to study and teach literature.

However, she was also drawn to a religious life of service. Dwyer spent more than 20 years as a religious sister teaching in Catholic schools. Meanwhile, she earned a B.S. in En-

glish and decided to continue on for her master's degree.

She chose to attend the Bread Loaf School of English in Vermont, an unconventional and liberal school. "The decision to attend Bread Loaf was a pivotal choice," said Dwyer. "It opened me to a world that was very different from the parish and community where I'd been living."

After this, she wanted still more immersion in literature. She chose to pursue a Ph.D. in American literature at George Washington University. A year into the program, she decided to leave the convent. She completed her dissertation with a study of "border crossing" in the works of Elizabeth Bishop, a writer who, because of her unconventionality, never quite found a comfortable fit in society.

Dwyer came to Shepherd to fill a one-year vacancy, which was then extended another year. Then she applied for and was awarded the position of director of the college's honors program, which provides special challenges for the school's brightest students. She served in this position, while continuing to teach English courses, until she was called on to lead the campus assessment initiative.

In her new role as dean, Dwyer is most excited about the opportunity to "create connections" among people. She has organized regular meetings of new faculty, new department chairs, and faculty interested in learning how to use technology in the classroom so that they might learn from each other.

Hamood receives Outstanding Educator Award from CPA group

FTE enrollment breaks record

Shepherd's FTE (full-time equivalent) enrollment for the fall semester is the highest FTE student enrollment in the history of the College. FTE enrollment is 3,586 for the fall semester, up 169 from last fall's FTE of 3,417. FTE is derived by dividing the total number of hours taken by all students by 15.

Headcount enrollment, which includes all full-time and part-time students, is 4,767, a 6.5 percent increase compared to last year's fall total of 4,391.

Shepherd offers 43 two- and four-year degree programs. In addition to offering associate's and bachelor's degrees, Shepherd is now beginning master's level programs.

"During the past 10 years, enrollment at Shepherd has grown by 31 percent," said Marie Carter, vice president for enrollment management. "This steady growth shows that Shepherd is a highly desirable institution, and we believe that if we want to continue to grow, the opportunity to do so is there."

Sixty-six percent of Shepherd College's students are West Virginia residents and among those in-state residents, most come from Berkeley County (48 percent), Jefferson County (28 percent), and Morgan County (four percent). Of the 34 percent of Shepherd's students who are from out-of-state, Maryland supplies 43 percent, Virginia 28 percent, and Pennsylvania about five percent. Shepherd enrolls students from 27 different countries and 48 different states. ♣

Emerson wins \$25,000 Rotary Scholarship to study abroad

Jessica M. Emerson is the recipient of the District 7350 Rotary Club Ambassadorial Scholarship, a \$25,000 prize which will allow her to continue her studies in New Zealand.

Emerson, a Shepherd senior, plans to travel to New Zealand to study in a one year graduate degree program in environmental management at either Lincoln University or the University of Auckland beginning January 2004.

According to Emerson, "I hope to gain a better knowledge of environmental issues from a country that is working from the ground up, rather than the top down, like the USA. I will also be sure to take in the whole atmosphere and do some glacier climbing and bungee jumping."

She plans to work on a Ph.D. after returning to the United States in January 2005.

An environmental studies major with a historic preservation minor, Emerson has been named to the Dean's List six times. She is a member of Delta Zeta Sorority and the Shepherd Environmental Organization, and she serves as a volunteer at the Shepherdstown Historic Museum and in the Adopt-a-Highway Program. She is scheduled to graduate from Shepherd this December.

A 1998 graduate of Hurricane High School, Emerson is the daughter of Larry and Adolia Emerson, Hurricane.

A committee of Rotary Club members from several clubs in District 7350 interviewed each candidate for the Ambassadorial Scholarship and reviewed each candidate's lengthy written materials. The committee ranked the candidates based on interview performance and upon the strength of the written materials. The Shepherdstown Rotary Club was Emerson's sponsor.

The purpose of the Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship Program is to further international understanding and world peace by increasing awareness of and respect for cultural differences and by developing leaders who can address the humanitarian needs of the world community. ♣

Her goal is for Shepherd to be known regionally for teaching excellence. And how will she help Shepherd get there? "I see myself as a sort of conductor," she explained, "starting up different sections of growth through grassroots efforts and building and promoting and offering resources."

One initiative that is gaining steam is the development of a teaching and learning center. "This would be a place in which to bring people together for discussions about teaching and learning," she explained. She is applying for a grant to determine the feasibility of renovating the little yellow building beside the Byrd Science Center so that it could house the new center. The circa-1790 building sits on one of the original lots that Thomas Shepherd laid out for his new town.

As for the main challenges she'll face in her new position, Dwyer cites budget issues and the compartmentalization so common in higher education. She advocates cross-disciplinary learning experiences because studies show that these give students a more complete understanding. She has already organized several "learning communities" in which students sign up for two courses that purposely center around common themes.

Dwyer intends to ensure that student learning remains the paramount piece around which everything else turns at Shepherd. "Teaching needs to be represented at all discussions," says Dwyer, "—those that involve budgets, strategic planning, enrollment management, and, more generally, the vision of the College." Rest assured that she will lead that advocacy.

The George Tyler Moore Center for the Study of the Civil War selected Kenneth W. Noe's *Perryville: This Grand Havoc of Battle* as the winner of the 2002 Seaborg Award for Civil War Nonfiction. Noe is Draughton Professor of History at Auburn University, Alabama. The book is published by the University Press of Kentucky.

Dr. Mark Snell, director of the Center, presented Noe with a check for \$5,000 at a ceremony held at the Perryville, Kentucky, battlefield during a reenactment celebrating the 140th anniversary of the battle on October 5 and 6.

A native of Virginia, Noe taught previously at West Georgia College and served as archivist at the Illinois Historical Survey while earning his doctorate at the University of Illinois. Noe joins a small circle of Civil War scholars who have merited this prize. ✦

Women's basketball preview

Jodie Runner, top assistant coach at Shepherd for the past five seasons, took over as head women's basketball coach after Betsy Blose accepted the job at UNC-Asheville last spring. A solid core of veterans and a talented group of newcomers should help the Rams challenge for the conference title again this season.

Shepherd will be led by junior guard Cassie Murray and senior forward Brienne Hamilton. Murray, a two-time First Team All-Conference selection, averaged 11.6 points and 6.2 rebounds for the Rams last year, while Hamilton added a 7.0 scoring average and was a force on the boards with an 8.0 rebounding average.

The starting guard tandem of juniors Ashana Cowans (8.4 ppg) and Ashley van Norden (5.0 ppg) returns to lead the Rams in the backcourt.

Other key returnees include sophomore guards Carrie Kunkel (5.2 ppg) and Lindsay Stewart (1.5 ppg), and junior guard/forward Gaynell Reese (3.7 ppg). Valerie Chaney, a 6-foot-3 junior forward/center, returns to the team after missing last season to concentrate on playing volleyball for the Rams.

Newcomers include freshmen Carolyn Malachi, LaToya Fisher, and Casey Landrum, and sophomore Lena Moore, a transfer from North Carolina A&T. All could make an immediate impact.

Shepherd will again have a tough non-conference schedule facing such challenging Division II opponents as Gannon, Shippensburg, and West Chester. The Rams will also face a Division I opponent in Marshall University this year.

Wedding gift inspires special fund for international students

The generous, selfless gesture of a Shepherd College graduate and his bride has sparked a new initiative by the Shepherd College Foundation.

Adrian Custer '98 and then-fiancée Brooke Knepper asked guests to their August wedding to forego buying the couple traditional wedding gifts. Instead, they requested that friends and relatives donate money for a

plane ticket so that the singer at their wedding, Shelley-Ann Francis, a student from South Africa, could go home for a visit. She has not been home since coming to the United States more than three years ago. Between the wedding contributions and a yard sale at Brooke's mother's church, over \$1,000 was raised and Shelley-Ann now has her ticket to fly home in January 2003.

"Those who know us," said Brooke Custer, "were not surprised by our request. It's a reflection of how we both grew up, our ties and values. We wanted our wedding to be not just about us, but to provide an opportunity to help someone else. We feel that this made our wedding more special and memorable for everyone who attended."

Reading in a Hagerstown newspaper about this unique wedding, Monica Lingenfelter, executive vice president of the Shepherd College Foundation, got the idea to create an emergency fund for international students at Shepherd College. "The example set by Adrian and Brooke speaks to the heart of what the Shepherd College Foundation is all about—providing the financial support needed to help students succeed at Shepherd College," said Lingenfelter.

Dr. Sharon Kipetz, vice president of student affairs, confirmed that such a need exists. "We had a student from Senegal just last year who, because of a death in

her family, was called home suddenly. Another student from Brazil incurred some sizable medical expenses. In both cases, the International Student Union raised money to help defray these unexpected costs.

"This type of support and recognition the Foundation is offering would go a long way in helping the College maintain and increase its culturally diverse student population, which is a great benefit to the entire College community," said Kipetz. "Also, international students who become part of the multicultural leadership program perform many hours of community service and help organize a number of campus-wide activities that help broaden all our students' outlooks on life and the world. It's a win-win for everyone."

The Foundation will provide \$1,000 from undesignated gifts for the fund, reports Lingenfelter, and additional money from International Student Union fundraising efforts may be added to that amount. The recommendation for expenditures will come from the Office of Student Affairs after careful consideration of each written request.

Adrian Custer, whose father and an aunt also graduated from Shepherd, is

thrilled that his and Brooke's wedding has inspired a special fund at his alma mater. "I see nothing but positives," he said. "Going to Shepherd was a great experience and my education prepared me to be a successful teacher. [This is his fifth year at Williamsport High School in Hagerstown, Maryland.] I'm glad we provided the motivation for this fund that will make it easier for some students to stay in school." ✦ Sharon Henderson

Faculty grants support College programs

Faculty members are actively involved in projects funded by government agencies, foundations, and corporate sponsors. Such awards enhance faculty expertise in their disciplines, acquire equipment for their departments, and support programs that take Shepherd College into the community.

Among recent awards is a grant of \$102,896 to Dr. Douglas Horner of the Department of Social Work from the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources through Title IV-E of the Social Security Act. The grant funds stipends for social work students and includes internships as child protection service interns. These positions can lead to future jobs with WVDHHR. More than 30 Shepherd students have benefited in the 10 years this project has existed.

The Shepherd College Department of Nursing, through the Community and Technical College of Shepherd, is the recipient of a consortium grant of \$219,600 over two years from the State Development Office, City Hospital/Gateway Foundation (Martinsburg), and Jefferson Memorial Hospital (Charles Town/Ranson) to hire two nurse instructors to recruit and train nurses to meet the need in the local communities.

Dr. Douglas Cooper of the Department of Education is the recipient of a \$9,490 grant from West Virginia’s Department of Education to build a teacher education partnership program with the local school systems in the College’s service area.

A grant of \$23,575 from the Higher Education Policy Commission enables the College’s Office of Student Affairs to provide multicultural education programs on campus including speakers and workshops. This project continues the College’s efforts to broaden multicultural understanding among students and in the community.

The Community and Technical College at Shepherd has received funding for projects including a collaborative program with the Berkeley County Schools Adult Education Program to enhance computer literacy among nontraditional adult students (\$40,000); a collaborative program to refurbish computer laboratories at the CTC’s satellite program with the United Auto Workers at General Motors’ Martinsburg facility and at the CTC’s Martinsburg campus (\$120,000); and independent accreditation as mandated by the state legislature (\$200,000).

A grant of \$1,000 from the West Virginia Humanities Council will enable the Department of Education to plan “Between Sisters,” an oral history project exploring how women view themselves in the context of modern society. The planning grant will lead to the submission of a larger grant proposal within the next year.

The Humanities Council also funded the Appalachian Writer-in-Residency Program for the Department of English with a \$4,800 grant. This year’s project brought renowned West Virginia writer Denise Giardina to campus for a weeklong residency. The project also funds the Young Writers Fiction Competition for young writers in the state who show promise and talent for writing fiction.

The Clay Foundation in Charleston is providing the Department of Music with \$150,000 in keyboard equipment that enables Dr. Scott Beard and his colleagues to teach music classes in an innovative manner. Such activity by the music faculty is among the reasons that Shepherd’s music department is one of the best in West Virginia and the region.

Shepherd’s faculty are exploring grant opportunities with the National Science Foundation, the West Virginia EPSCoR Program, the Veterans Affairs Administration, and other agencies that will enhance the quality of undergraduate education programs for Shepherd students. ✦ *James A. Watson*
