Since 2013, Shepherd University has been the only National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Summer Institute for Teachers in West Virginia, bringing teachers from across the nation to study Appalachian storytelling, music, literature, and culture—culminating in an extraordinary Appalachian road-trip that gives teachers a view of the Appalachian heartland and West Virginia. The goals of the program are

- to explore the range of storytelling and literature created by Appalachian writers, both classic and contemporary.
- to achieve an understanding of the culture, history, and heritage of a region often stereotyped and misunderstood.
- to provide professional development opportunities for participants so that they can become better educators.
- to encourage participants to engage in critical thinking and interaction with colleagues across the nation from a variety of backgrounds and disciplines to expand the intellectual depth and experience.
- to broaden participants' experience and understanding as they are challenged through the literature and storytelling explored in the institute, through contemporary American plays presented during CATF's season, and through the cultural activities and events encountered during the threeweek institute.

These programs are presented by the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Shepherd University Center for Appalachian Studies and Communities, and community partners. All events in this brochure are free and open to the public, with the exception of the Speak Story Series.


