### *From the Chair*

#### **Shepherd University announces its new School of Music**

Since May 2017, the academic restructuring committee and campus leaders have led the effort to develop and vet potential academic administrative models with the campus community. The results of that included significant savings and restructuring of several academic units. With the approval from Shepherd University's Board of Governors, our department will be recognized as the new School of Music starting in August 2019!

The formation of the new school is in recognition of a strong tradition of music education, artistic excellence, and strong community engagement. Our fundraising success represents the collective, coordinated efforts of our music faculty and staff, the Foundation staff, Shepherd's president, provost, and alumni, and many community members committed to supporting our students and our mission.

The chair and staff of the Department of Music work weekly with Shepherd University Foundation staff and key supporters in the community to coordinate fundraising activities, including two of our largest fundraising projects: an annual scholarship showcase, with a goal of \$35,000, and a five-year All-Steinway School campaign, with a goal of \$1.5 million.

Since October 2014, we have raised more than \$500,000 for scholarships, pianos, student travels, regional tours and performances, a three-year guitar festival, and equipment purchases that impact our community ensembles. This also includes three endowed scholarships, totaling \$75,000. Additionally, becoming a School of Music will provide the potential naming opportunity to recognize our donors and supporters.

The Department of Music serves the university and the region through complex and diverse offerings in academic programming, education, and cultural enrichment. Our Community Music program offers educational opportunities to more than 500 people through our private

music lessons, music classes from children through adults, ensembles, music appreciation, and instrument courses. Each June, we also offer jazz and string orchestra camps for middle school and high school youth. Serving as the regional music center, the Department of Music provides nearly 100 public performances each academic year, many with pre-concert lectures and workshops.

Our faculty believe in providing access to all students in our university ensembles and productions. Within the ensembles, members can build progressive musical skills leading to developing tomorrow's educators, artists, and innovators. Hundreds of participants are served by numerous and varied musical experiences in solo and ensemble settings each year.

It will take some time to complete adjustments in new processes associated with the implementation of the new academic structure. On behalf of our students and colleagues, thanks to our supporters for helping make this longtime aspiration a reality! ■

## Shepherd Youth Chorus to sing in Mandarin during May 1 concert

"Shan chuan zhuang li, wu chan feng long." The Shepherd Youth Chorus members echoed Dr. David Gonzol, chorus director and professor of music, singing a few Mandarin words, which means magnificent mountains and rivers and abundant and diverse good at a time.

The chorus is learning the Taiwanese "National Flag Song," or "Kuo Chi Ge" in Mandarin. A stirring patriotic song composed in 1937 by the 33-year-old composer Huang Tzi, who died one year after the song was written, his song lives on, sung by Taiwanese today.

"We often do a national song. We've done the national anthems from Austria, Australia, Canada, France, and, of course, the United States," said Gonzol.

"But one day I was thinking, Dr. [Yu-Hsuan] Liao is right here, and we should sing a song from Taiwan.

Liao, a Taiwan native and associate professor of music, recommended the song and coached Gonzol on pronunciation.

"We want the chorus to pronounce the lyrics authentically," Gonzol added.

"The chorus is learning solfège for all the songs. They learn to read the music on the staff. And, actually, the one evening, they sight-read the notation for 'Kuo Chi Ge,' even singing fa and ti fairly in tune. Our years of work are paying off. I'm proud of them," said Gonzol.

"They're like sponges," Gonzol said. "They can learn so much at a young age, and they're not afraid of foreign languages. They think of it as getting a real chance—an exotic adventure."


"And every Wednesday when they're leaving, certain students always come up to me to very politely say, 'Thank you.' They are so pleased to have the chance to learn to read music and sing well. They're proud of themselves, too."

All full-time music faculty visit eight to 12 high schools annually to serve as guest clinicians in West Virginia, Maryland, Virginia, and Pennsylvania to work with choral and instrumental ensembles of all sizes; piano, guitar, and composition classes; and individuals.

### Outreach programs

Part-time faculty also conduct solo visits or take their chamber groups to high schools for the purposes of education, coaching, and recruitment.

### Annual Honor Music Festival

The annual Honor Music Festival—a three-day event—invites high school students to play in an auditioned wind ensemble, jazz band, or choir, and our faculty serve as section leaders, ensemble directors, and coaches. More than 60 percent of our instrumental music majors have attended our Honor Band at least once. We have scheduled the event for the fall 2019 and have added a choral/vocal component to the event.

### Free trial lessons

We offer a free, 30-minute applied lesson to potential students to allow them to get to know the applied teachers better.

### Faculty activities

Our full-time faculty actively represent Shepherd University by appearing as guest clinicians, judges, and artists at regional and national conferences and festivals.

Students, who are recommended by our program alumni, have participated in one or more of our recruiting activities mentioned above. This means:

- They are familiar with our educators.
- They know the close ties between Shepherd University and our community.
- They know they will receive a highly personalized, transformative undergraduate-focused education.

Consequently, 85 percent of the students who auditioned and are accepted to our program enroll at Shepherd—that is well above the national average.
